FAMILY

It isn't easy and takes a lot of hard work. Folks who are invested for the long haul (think decades). Ready to invest in one another. People who aren't going to parish hop when things get bad, just like you don't leave the house because of a few arguments (note - there are valid reasons for changing a parish that I am not addressing here). Folks who are going to reach out and take initiative to serve others. People who are willing to invest deeply in a handful of others, then influence more.

Still, community is not friendship and friendship is not community. There is interplay between the two, but they are not the same thing. Community is wider, friendships are smaller. So, while you ought to form friendships within a community, not everyone in the community needs to be your friend. This lifts some of the burden off of us. While we are called to love and serve all in the Christian community, we don't have to be super close to everyone. So, we can now see that community is not just about me and my friends. It is about "we". We need each other. We need the person that annoys us. We need the difficult people.

Just like the fact that siblings have to grow up in the same house and it is good for them to do so. We need others that challenge us. We need to be pushed to love those who are hard to love. This is why we need a community that is larger than just friends.

Just as you can't be a disciple of Jesus when you live a life apart from him, you can't be a part of Christian community and live apart from others (or Jesus). We need to have a bigger picture and part of what parishes need to do is try to foster authentic community and not just events and programs. These things can help start community, but without intentional leadership that has a vision for the long haul, it probably won't happen.

We don't need novelty. We need authenticity.

Catholics understand the need for others. We rely on the Saints and leaders of our Church to help us understand prayer, theology, Scripture, the Sacraments, etc. In the same way, we need to mine the depths of the great Catholics who have come before us in terms of community. How did they live, serve, and pray together?

Let us pray that we can truly grow in community. Not a false veneer of it. A community where we can learn to be saints, together. Where we can love Jesus, be challenged to grow, pray together, live side-by-side, and serve each other. This is community. It is messy and necessary.

Reflection on Article "The Messy Necessity of Authentic Catholic Community" by Melissa Bear

Last month the Pastoral Council had a retreat in which the article above and in the previous two weeks' bulletins was used as part of our reflection on what it means to be a Catholic, parish community. The message of this article not only resonated with me, but others on the Pastoral Council as well, which is why it was chosen to be shared with the whole parish family.

Parish family is not a term to be taken lightly and is not meant to illicit "Catholic guilt." Think about the early church or the times in which the church has faced persecution throughout history, there was such a strong sense of a "community of faith." Truly, St. Philip Benizi has been a parish family and community of faith for me. The very beginning of this article grabbed me in because much like the author, I have been to many other Catholic Churches (one for 2 full years) where nobody ever spoke to me and I did not speak to anyone. Spiritually, I was on my own. I missed the community and sense of belonging I had at St. Philip Benizi since the time my family moved to SPB around the time I was in Kindergarten.

Just like any family, our parish family has had its ups and downs. We upset each other and even argue at times, but at the end of the day we are a parish family. By no means are we perfect, but we are called to embrace the mess and place Christ at the center. We are called to call each other on to holiness and journey together to heaven. "This is my commandment: love one another as I love you." John 15:12.

Saint of the Week: Blessed Miguel Pro January 13, 1891- November 23, 1927

Miguel was always known to have a sweet disposition growing up in his devoutly Catholic family in Mexico. At the age of 20, he entered the Jesuit order and began the seminary. However, when the Mexican Revolution started in 1914, many religious orders were forced to flee, sending Miguel to finish the seminary in Spain and Belgium. In 1925 "Padre Miguel Pro" was ordained. Shortly after his ordination, Miguel was sent to Mexico City, despite continued religious persecution. However, since he was not known to the authorities as a priest, Miguel was able to administer the sacraments and celebrate Mass underground in Mexico.



In 1927, there was a failed assassination attempt on President Calles. Miguel and his brothers were accused by the authorities and arrested on trumped-up charges. The three Pro brothers were found guilty. Miguel Pro was sentenced to a firing squad, which he faced boldly. Before his execution, he stretched out his arms like a cross and his last words were "Viva Cristo Rey!" or "Long live Christ the King!"

Blessed Miguel Pro, pray for us!


