Know Your Catechism

Part Two: The Celebration of the Christian Mystery

Article 3. The Sacrament of the Eucharist
II. What is This Sacrament Called?

The inexhaustible richness of this sacrament is expressed in the different names we give it. Each name evokes certain aspects of it. It is called: Eucharist, because it is an action of thanks giving to God. the Greek words *eucharistein* and *eulogein* recall the Jewish blessings that proclaim - especially during a meal - God's works: creation, redemption, and sanctification.

The Lord's Supper, because of its connection with the supper which the Lord took with his disciples on the eve of his Passion and because it anticipates the wedding feast of the Lamb in the heavenly Jerusalem.

The *Breaking of Bread*, because Jesus used this rite, part of a Jewish meat when as master of the table he blessed and distributed the bread, above all at the Last Supper. It is by this action that his disciples will recognize him after his Resurrection, and it is this expression that the first Christians will use to designate their Eucharistic assemblies; by doing so they signified that all who eat the one broken bread, Christ, enter into communion with him and form but one body in him.

The *Eucharistic assembly (synaxis)*, because the Eucharist is celebrated amid the assembly of the faithful, the visible expression of the Church.

1330 The *memorial* of the Lord's Passion and Resurrection.

The Holy Sacrifice, because it makes present the one sacrifice of Christ the Savior and Catechism is Day 181 in the Catechism in a Year. includes the Church's offering. The terms holy sacrifice of the Mass, "sacrifice of praise," spiritual sacrifice, pure and holy sacrifice are also used, since it completes and surpasses all the sacrifices of the Old Covenant.


The *Holy and Divine Liturgy*, because the Church's whole liturgy finds its center and most intense expression in the celebration of this sacrament; in the same sense we also call its celebration the *Sacred Mysteries*. We speak of the *Most Blessed Sacrament* because it is the Sacrament of sacraments. the Eucharistic species reserved in the tabernacle are designated by this same name.

1331 Holy Communion, because by this sacrament we unite ourselves to Christ, who makes us sharers in his Body and Blood to form a single body. We also call it: the holy things (ta hagia; sancta) - the first meaning of the phrase "communion of saints" in the Apostles' Creed - the bread of angels, bread from heaven, medicine of immortality, viaticum....

1332 Holy Mass (Missa), because the liturgy in which the mystery of salvation is accomplished concludes with the sending forth (missio) of the faithful, so that they may fulfill God's will in their daily lives.

Saint of the Week: St. Juan Diego

1474-1548



Despite the violence Juan Diego and his wife, Maria saw from the Spanish conquistadors, they saw something special in the Franciscan friars who evangelized to the Chichimeca people. At the age of 50 Juan Diego was baptized along with his wife.

In December 1531, Mary began to appear to Juan Diego. On December 9th, as he was walking to church, he heard a bird calling him on Tepeyac Hill. Juan followed it and was astonished to see Our Lady appearing to him. Mary spoke to Juan Diego in his native

language, telling him to ask Bishop Zumarraga to build a church on Tepeyac Hill.

Juan Diego spoke with Bishop Zumarraga twice, pleading with him to build the church that Mary had requested. Finally, the skeptical Bishop Zumarraga asked for a sign. On December 12th 1531, as Juan was on his way to deliver last rites to his uncle, Juan purposefully avoided Tepeyac Hill, and Our Lady, in order to reach his uncle quickly. However, she appeared to him anyways. She instructed Juan to climb the hill and pick roses she had left for him in the snow. Juan Diego gathered the roses in his tilma to bring as a sign to Bishop Zumarraga. When Juan Diego lowered the roses in front of the Zumarraga, the image of Our Lady of Guadalupe appeared.

Our Lady of Guadalupe

Did you Know?

On Tuesday, December 12th we celebrate the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Get to know more about Our Lady's miraculous apparition with these fun facts!

- 1. The image of Our Lady of Guadalupe appeared on St. Juan Diego's tilma when he brought roses gathered in the middle of winter to Bishop Zumarraga, as a sign from Mary. Studies have found that the image is not painted or drawn
- 2. Our Lady's image has remained, despite incidents. In the 1700's acid was accidentally spilt on the image and in 1921 a bomb was place near the image, but no damage was done.
- 3. Our Lady of Guadalupe's eyes reflect people, as if she were looking at them. Microscopically, St. Juan Diego and Bishop Zumarraga can be seen in her eyes, along with others.
- The black ribbon around Our Lady of Guadalupe's waist indicates that she is pregnant, and analysis from doctors have determined her to be in her 9th month of pregnancy.
- 5. The stars on the image align with the constellations in the sky on December 12, 1531, which is when the image appeared on the tilma.
