St. Philip Benizi Mission Statement

St. Philip Benizi Catholic Church being part of the universal church shares in its mission: to proclaim Jesus Christ who came to the world to fulfill His father's will; by proclaiming the kingdom of God, building up the parish community as a witness to God's love and care for the world, helping one another to become what God has called us to be. The presence of Christ by the power of his word and the Holy Spirit

1373 "Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised from the dead, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us," is present in many ways to his Church: in his word, in his Church's prayer, "where two or three are gathered in my name," in the poor, the sick, and the imprisoned, in the sacraments of which he is the author, in the sacrifice of the Mass, and in the person of the minister. But "he is present . . . most especially in the Eucharistic species."

1374 The mode of Christ's presence under the Eucharistic species is unique. It raises the Eucharist above all the sacraments as "the perfection of the spiritual life and the end to which all the sacraments tend. "In the most blessed sacrament of the Eucharist "the body and blood, together with the soul and divinity, of our Lord Jesus Christ and, therefore, *the whole Christ is truly, really, and substantially* contained." "This presence is called 'real' - by which is not intended to exclude the other types of presence as if they could not be 'real' too, but because it is presence in the fullest sense: that is to say, it is a *substantial* presence by which Christ, God and man, makes himself wholly and entirely present."

1375 It is by the conversion of the bread and wine into Christ's body and blood that Christ becomes present in this sacrament. the Church Fathers strongly affirmed the faith of the Church in the efficacy of the Word of Christ and of the action of the Holy Spirit to bring about this conversion. Thus St. John Chrysostom declares:

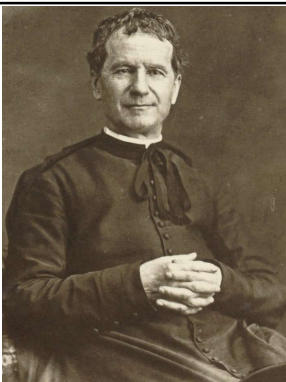
It is not man that causes the things offered to become the Body and Blood of Christ, but he who was crucified for us, Christ himself. the priest, in the role of Christ, pronounces these words, but their power and grace are God's. This is my body, he says. This word transforms the things offered.

And St. Ambrose says about this conversion:

Be convinced that this is not what nature has formed, but what the blessing has consecrated. the power of the blessing prevails over that of nature, because by the blessing nature itself is changed.... Could not Christ's word, which can make from nothing what did not exist, change existing things into what they were not before? It is no less a feat to give things their original nature than to change their nature.

1376 The Council of Trent summarizes the Catholic faith by declaring: "Because Christ our Redeemer said that it was truly his body that he was offering under the species of bread, it has always been the conviction of the Church of God, and this holy Council now declares again, that by the consecration of the bread and wine there takes place a change of the whole substance of the bread into the substance of the body of Christ our Lord and of the whole substance of the wine into the substance of his blood. This change the holy Catholic Church has fittingly and properly called transubstantiation."

1377 The Eucharistic presence of Christ begins at the moment of the consecration and endures as long as the Eucharistic species subsist. Christ is present whole and entire in each of the species and whole and entire in each of their parts, in such a way that the breaking of the bread does not divide Christ.



Saint of the Week: St. John Bosco

August 16, 1815-January 31, 1888

St. John Bosco was born into a place of great need at a difficult time. At the age of two, John Bosco's father died, leaving Margaret Bosco to raise John and two brothers. From an early age, John worked as a shepherd and was taught by his parish priest. Although his obligations of work often pulled him from his studies, John desired to continually learn more.

Around the age of nine, John watched a traveling circus. He was amazed by their tricks and ability to hold everyone's attention, so he decided to put on his own show. He learned magic tricks and put on a show for other kids, ending his show with the homily he had heard at Mass that day. Later, John Bosco cited this as his early call to the priesthood. In 1835, John Bosco entered the seminary.

In 1841, John Bosco was ordained a priest. His first assignment was in the city of Turin, Italy. Turin at this time was a typical city during the Industrial Revolution, with many poor neighborhoods and children

working. Fr. Bosco quickly realized that while visiting prisoners, there were many boys between the ages of 12 and 18 in jail. In response, Fr. Bosco began to meet with boys in the city where they would usually gather and began to preach and build relationship with them. By the 1860's Fr. Bosco and his mother Margaret housed 800 boys. Fr. Bosco was also known for identifying certain young men who had great qualities of a priest and encouraging vocations. In 1859, he founded the Salesians. **St. John Bosco, pray for us!**

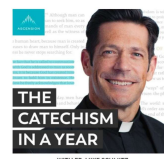

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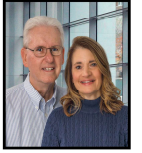
