

Know Your Catechism

Part Two: The Celebration of the Christian Mystery Article 3. The Sacrament of the Eucharist VI. The Paschal Banquet

"Take this and eat it, all of you": communion

1384 The Lord addresses an invitation to us, urging us to receive him in the sacrament of the Eucharist: "Truly, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of man and drink his blood, you have no life in you."

1385 To respond to this invitation we must *prepare ourselves* for so great and so holy a moment. St. Paul urges us to examine our conscience: "Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty of profaning the body and blood of the Lord. Let a man examine himself, and so eat of the bread and drink of the cup. For any one who eats and drinks without discerning the body eats and drinks judgment upon himself." Anyone conscious of a grave sin must receive the sacrament of Reconciliation before coming to communion.

1386 Before so great a sacrament, the faithful can only echo humbly and with ardent faith the words of the Centurion: "Domine, non sum dignus ut intres sub tectum meum, sed tantum dic verbo, et sanabitur anima mea" ("Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word and my soul will be healed."). and in the Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom the faithful pray in the same spirit:

O Son of God, bring me into communion today with your mystical supper. I shall not tell your enemies the secret, nor kiss you with Judas' kiss. But like the good thief I cry, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom."

The Catechism in a Year Podcast

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Want to listen to the Catechism with commentary/ explanation? This excerpt of the Catechism is Day 190 in the Catechism in a Year.

1387 To prepare for worthy reception of this sacrament, the faithful should observe the fast required in their Church. Bodily demeanor (gestures, clothing) ought to convey the respect, solemnity, and joy of this moment when Christ becomes our guest.

1388 It is in keeping with the very meaning of the Eucharist that the faithful, if they have the required dispositions, *receive communion* each time they participate in the Mass. As the Second Vatican Council says: "That more perfect form of participation in the Mass whereby the faithful, after the priest's communion, receive the Lord's Body from the same sacrifice, is warmly recommended."

1389 The Church obliges the faithful "to take part in the Divine Liturgy on Sundays and feast days" and, prepared by the sacrament of Reconciliation, to receive the Eucharist at least once a year, if possible during the Easter season. But the Church strongly encourages the faithful to receive the holy Eucharist on Sundays and feast days, or more often still, even daily.

1390 Since Christ is sacramentally present under each of the species, communion under the species of bread alone makes it possible to receive all the fruit of Eucharistic grace. For pastoral reasons this manner of receiving communion has been legitimately established as the most common form in the Latin rite. But "the sign of communion is more complete when given under both kinds, since in that form the sign of the Eucharistic meal appears more clearly." This is the usual form of receiving communion in the Eastern rites.

Saint of the Week: Sts. Methodius and Cyril 815-885 826-869

Born into a prominent family in Theselonica, Sts. Methodius and Cyril were brothers that worked together to spread the faith to people in Slavic lands. Growing up in Greece in the 800s, it is believed that they both grew up speaking the Slavic languages due to a high Slavic population in Greece at the time.

Methodius, the older brother, was an important civil official, but retired to a monastery on Mt. Olympus. Cyril became a popular scholar and professor, commonly known as "The Philosopher."

In 860 or 861, Methodius was sent by the imperial government to evangelize in Crimea. Cyril joined his brother on this trip and both spent a lot of time in Crimea, preaching to people in their native Slavic language. While on this trip, Cyril located the tomb of Pope Clement I and gathered his relics to be



brought back to Greece, and eventually Rome.

After returning from Crimea, the brothers were requested by Prince Ratislav of Moravia to serve as missionaries in Moravia. During their time there, Methodius and Cyril translated the Mass into Slavic languages, the vernacular in the region. Their missionary work in Moravia was very fruitful, eventually leading Methodius and Cyril to seek a blessing from Pope Adrian II.

On their trip to Rome, Methodius and Cyril returned the relics of Pope Clement I. Cyril fell seriously ill in Rome, sending Methodius back to continue missionary work on his own. Cyril died on February 14th 869 in Rome. Methodius continued his work until his death in 885. Sts. Methodius and Cyril, Apostles of the Slavs, pray for us!

USCCB Guidelines for Lenten Fasting

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.


For members of the Roman Catholic Church, the norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Roman Catholic Church from age 14 onwards.
